DEAR JUNIORS.—Here is the correct solution to last week's competition—640. Does that amaze you? Well, take another look at the picture you were asked to judge, and read once again, very carefully, the question you had to answer: "How many ways can the motorist at J get to R without passing along the same piece of road twice on one journey?"

You have obviously only to consider the variation of route between U and O. Here there are nine sections or lines, but it is impossible for a car under the conditions to traverse more than seven of these lines in any route. In the following table, by directions is meant the order of the stations, irrespective of routes.

Thus the direction UNIO gives nine routes, because there are three ways of getting from U to N and three ways of getting from N to O. But the direction UNO admits of no variation, therefore yields only one route.

2 two-line directions of 3 routes= 6
1 three-line direction of 1 route= 1
1 three-line direction of 9 routes= 9
2 four-line directions of 6 routes= 12
2 four-line directions of 18 routes= 36
6 five-line directions of 6 routes= 36
2 five-line directions of 18 routes= 36
2 six-line directions of 36 routes= 72
12 seven-line directions of 36 routes= 432

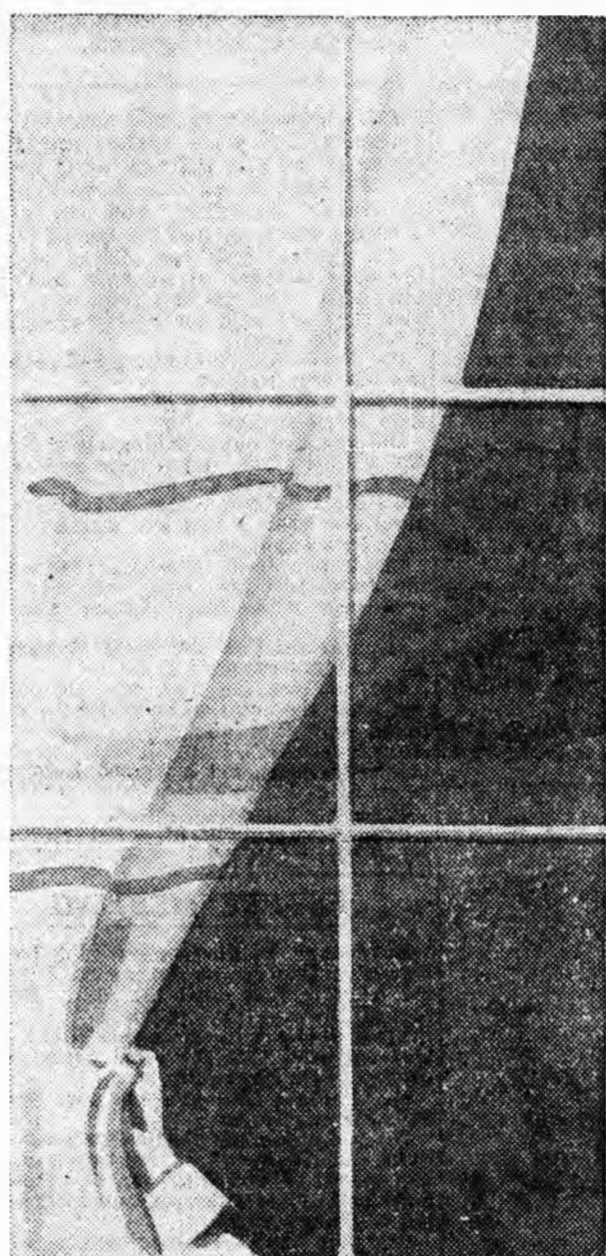

NUMBER MAGIC

MANY mystic qualities are possessed by the number nine. Here, for example, is an interesting "stunt."

Ask some one to select any number greater than nine. Suppose the number 357 is selected. Add up the three digits and you get 15. Subtracting this from 357 leaves 342, and the sum of these digits is nine.

Another "stunt" with numbers is a trick of a mind-reading nature. Request some one to think of a number, multiply it by three, add one, multiply the result by three, and add the selected number. At this point he must tell you the result of the sum, when you will name the chosen number.

Here is an example in which the number 357 also is used:—
Multiplying 357 by 3 gives 1,071. Add one and it is 1,072. Multiplying 1,072 by 3 gives 3,216. Add the original number, 357, and the result is 3,573. Cancel the last figure and you have 357.
