EVERY CHANCE TO GET HIS ENGLAND CAP MANY TEAM CHANGES:: ARSENAL WITHOUT JOHN

MANY changes have been made in Football League teams for tomorrow's games, but none indicate such a handsome gesture as has been made by Birmingham F.C. Harry Hibbs, their goalkeeper, lost his chance to play for England against Scotland last year because of a serious head injury in the international trial. Birmingham intend him to have every chance if a year, and have rested him of tomorrow's game against Huddersfield.

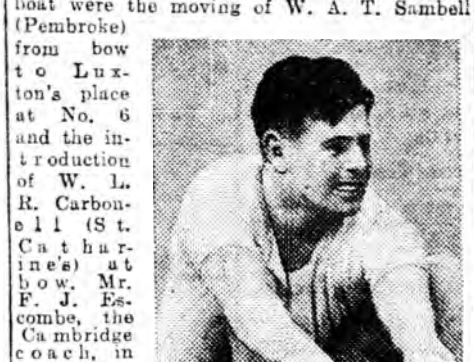
ARMY CHAMPIONS

LUXTON RETIRES FROM CAMBRIDGE CREW

Oxford President Twice Catches A Crab TRIAL TO-DAY (Race to be rowed April 1, at 3.30.) THE first sensations of the 1933 University Boat-race yesterday disturbed the otherwise peaceful preparation of the crews.

L. Luxton (Pembroke), on medical advice, retired from the Cambridge boat, and W. D. C. Erskine-Crum, the Oxford president, had the annoying experience of twice catching a crab, once in perfectly smooth water.



The changes necessary in the Cambridge boat were the moving of W. A. T. Sambell from bow to L. Luxton's place in No. 6, and the introduction of W. L. R. Carboneil (Shrewsbury) and J. R. Gilmour (Eton) and Trinity Hall, 12 0 6.

the Grand Cup at Henley before he went to the Olympiads at Los Angeles as one of Great Britain's representatives. Only on two previous occasions has there been such a late change in the order of rowing in either crew. In 1922 J. E. Pender took the place of G. H. Barter in the Oxford boat two days before the race, Barter having to leave owing to a torn muscle in his back.

SHORT OUTINGS Cambridge had two short outings yesterday, the principal work being the strokes of rowing in the morning and a minute row with a Clare College eight in the afternoon. Varsity crews finished three-quarters of a length up, putting in 361 strokes.

W. D. C. Erskine-Crum, the Oxford President, caught the first crab of the 1933 practice in the morning, when the Dark Blues were racing a Magdalen College, Oxford, eight. He missed his stroke and nearly fell into the water opposite the boat-house.

His second "crab" occurred in the afternoon outing, and, surprisingly, in smooth water. The Cambridge out-rigger in the boat was broken and a new one had to be fitted.

Oxford are to row a full course trial on a flood tide to-morrow. The final order of rowing for the race has been fixed as follows: CAMBRIDGE. 1. W. L. R. Carboneil (Shrewsbury) and St. John's, 12 0 6.
